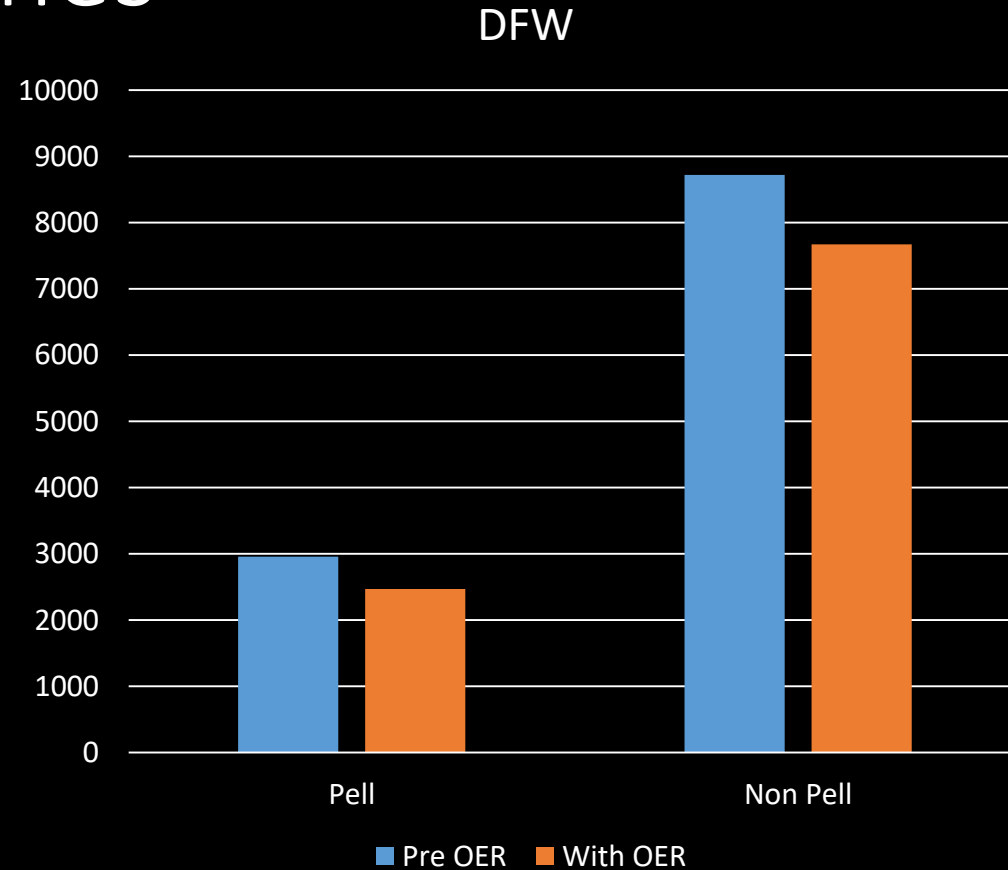
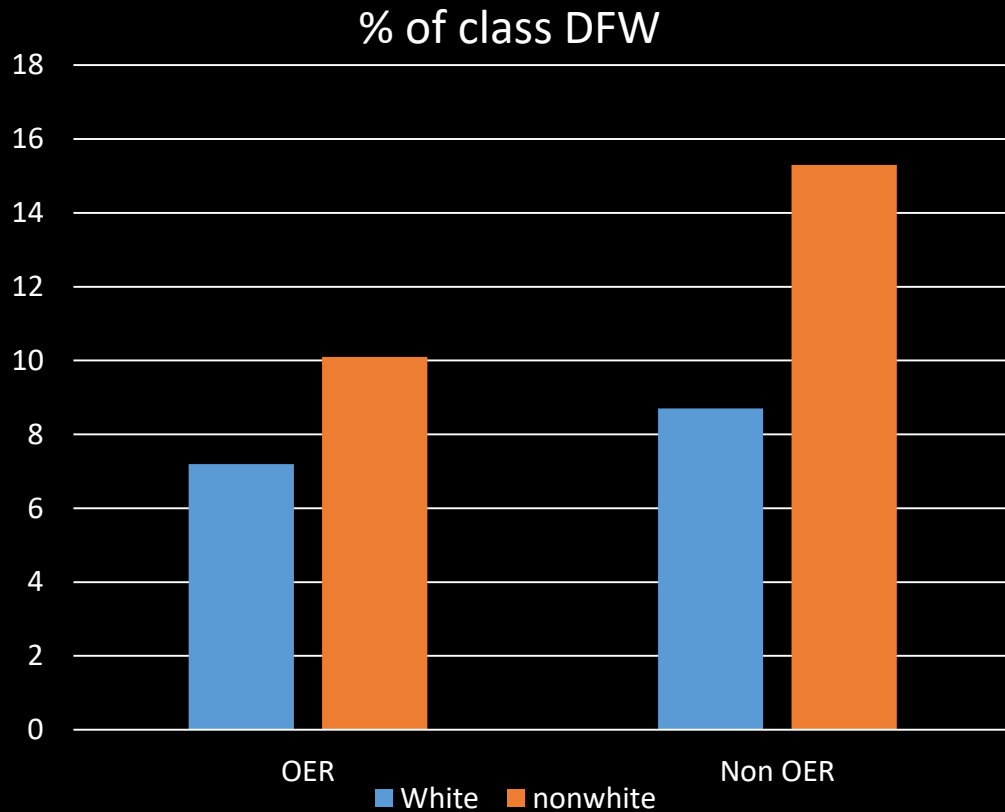

What is the Public Service degree?

- The A.S. in Public Service (traditional) is a public sector management degree. Program graduates either transfer to four-year university or enter the workforce to work in city, county, state or federal government or in the non-profit sector.
- The A.S. in Public Service (legal case management) is a degree that prepares students to work in a legal position. Students may also transfer to a four-year university and pursue fields such as criminal justice or political science.

Curriculum

- Knowledge based – students learn public sector finance, human resource management, grant-writing and public administration.
- Skill-based – students learn practical skills in budget preparation, public management and making public policy
- Courses in public law, public administration, public sector finance, leadership and human resource management

- Practicum experience in community setting

About TSTI students:

- 80% of students are native or heritage speakers of Spanish; many are first generation college students
- Have had students from 15 countries in Latin America + Africa
- Practical learning improves both English and Spanish communication skills
- Professional language abilities can be applied in any employment situation
- Graduates are working in healthcare, legal, business, social services, and education settings
- Many students continue on to further higher education or professional certification (Healthcare/ Medical Interpreter or Registered/Certified Courtroom Interpreter)

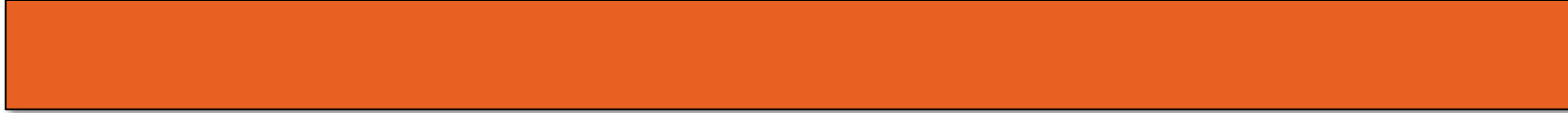
